#### **History of New Hampshire Cooperative School Districts**

RSA 195 passed – 1947

First cooperative formed – 1954

1950's – 4

1960's – 17 (Likely motivated by additional building aid.)

1970's – 4

1980's – 2

1990's - 3

Last one formed – 2005.

None have been formed in the past 20 years. Telling.

Goshen-Lempster disbanded sometime after 2008. Others cooperatives over the years may have disbanded as well.

Surry and Sullivan left Monadnock.

Dublin and Francestown are considering withdrawal from ConVal.

Today – 53% of NH towns remain independent, 78 years after RSA 195 passed.

Four cooperatives operate only high schools:

John Stark, Pemi-Baker, Souhegan and Winnacunnet

Four others operate only middle school/high school cooperatives.


Only one cooperative – Lafayette, is a K-6 cooperative only.

Are Cooperatives superior delivery models?

Educationally – no evidence, but none formed in past 20 years and 53% of towns still independent 78 year later would seem to indicate no.

Financially (economies of scale) – Independent area districts in the lower Connecticut River Valley operate at about \$800 less per elementary student than area cooperatives. Fall Mountain K-8 schools have gone from \$621 below state average in 2007-2008 to \$4,192 above state average last school year – a swing of \$4,813. With approximately 900 elementary students, that's \$3,772,800 annually over state average today and \$4,331,700 annually over our 2007-2008 baseline.

### The Alternative Path to Withdrawal

**195:16-a Increase or Decrease in Grades.** – Any cooperative school district may amend its existing arrangement or articles of agreement to increase or decrease the grades for which the cooperative school district provides education. If the cooperative district was organized pursuant to RSA 195:18, it shall proceed by amendment of its articles of agreement. The cooperative school board shall cease responsibility for the excluded school grades as of the date specified in the amended articles of agreement or the existing arrangement.

**Note:** Our articles of agreement require a 2/3 vote for any change, so that's the bar we'd have to meet. Additionally, this has to go on the school warrant. While it could be by petition, good luck getting 2/3 of the vote. We'd need the school board to place it there and support it. Finally, we would need to amend the high school apportionment formula, as the current one can't be administered as is after the change. This would all have to be one warrant article. In all, it may be a heavy lift. Without school board support, it will almost surely fail. It can have a forward effective date to provide time to prepare. Perhaps two full school years after passage. The upside is that this approach requires no formal study as it does not require State Board approval.
